


# INTERDISCIPLINARY and INDIVIDUALZED STUDY

- Make excellent, meaningful, flexible, and innovative education accessible to CUNY students.
- Empower students to build futureforward, interdisciplinary programs of study, allowing learners to draw on different disciplinary perspectives to explore a topic that is too complex to address with a single discipline (Klein & Newell, 1996) and to prepare for fields of study and careers that don't yet exist.
- Unite a constellation of support around the student, including an academic advisor, faculty mentor, robust community of students and alumni, funding opportunities, and home campus.

# A Future Forward Education

The CUNY BA is the interdisciplinary, individualized major across CUNY, an award-winning engine of social mobility. Created in 1971, the major allows students to create their own area of specialization outside of traditional majors. The interdisciplinary approach encourages students to draw on different disciplinary perspectives, integrate their learning, and to explore a topic that is too broad or complex to address with a single discipline (Klein & Newell, 1997). Interdisciplinary work represents the future of knowledge, allowing students to "think outside the box," and in some cases, to consider the world's great problems. See sample majors, called areas of concentration, on the program website.



Like a more accessible honors program, students receive additional support, such as an assigned academic advisor, exclusive access to scholarships, and the opportunity to build relationships while working directly with faculty mentors and the CUNY BA community, which includes staff, faculty, student leaders, campus coordinators, and allies. Students in the major have greater access to high-impact learning opportunities

Individualized majors are an important nexus of equity, giving students access to excellent, meaningful, personalized education. While requirements to apply to CUNY BA are minimal (12 college credits and a 2.8 GPA), CUNY BA students are highly successful, with an average 73% of students graduating with Latin honors.

# Applied Interdisciplinarity: Breadth and Depth of Fields of Study across CUNY BA



















#### Laureate Corner: CUNY BA Students and Alumni

**Stephanie Theolin**, LaGuardia Community College '23, City College '25, is graduating with a CUNY BA degree in **international political communication**. She likes to say she is "making her dreams come true,

one at a time." She is passionate about crisis communications and global advocacy and hopes to use media and diplomacy to amplify marginalized voices as she moves forward in her career. Stephanie grew up in Port-au-Prince, Haiti, and spent school vacations visiting family in the U.S. She briefly worked as a journalist for *The Haitian Times* and migrated to the U.S in 2021 to pursue her studies here.

When she's not studying, Stephanie is working a full-time job at a law office. She has also interned as a court interpreter with the NYS Unified Court System. Stephanie talked about the impact of some of her favorite coursework. "I took this Latin American & Caribbean History course. I loved learning about rich and diverse cultures, revolutionary movements, untold stories and colonialism and its impact. The class also helped me understand my identity as a Caribbean and Haitian woman."



Inspired by her sister who was also graduated from the CUNY BA, **Ella Morton** saw a chance to return to college after previously dropping out. Through CUNY BA's 4+1 **Accelerated Graduate Program with** 



Masters in Liberal Studies at the Graduate Center, Ella took both undergraduate and graduate courses, completing her BA in Material Culture, studying the relationship between people and the objects they create. After she finished, the accelerated graduate program set her up to pursue a master's degree in American Studies at the CUNY Graduate Center, which she plans to complete in the fall.

Ella currently also works for JP Morgan Chase as a Senior Associate for Content Design. Since her CUNY BA concentration was focused on real world objects, she didn't expect to work in the User Experience (UX) field, which deals with the interactions between a client and a

product, service, system or brand. She shares that her background and experience in anthropology and art history, which she integrated in her BA degree, has helped her in the workplace, especially when determining how to address or influence user behavior with design.

"This is a fundamental part of UX, and CUNY BA helped me develop confidence and curiosity to ask the big 'Why' questions that continue to guide me day-to-day."

# **CUNY BA Students**





Iraj Zia wanted to combine her love for accounting with something that was centered on public service, created a dual concentration in Fraud Examination and Financial Forensics and Public Administration. With the support of personal academic advisors, a general advisor and a professor mentor, Iraj says that she received "the attention one would get from a small school in a large school." The CUNY BA advising team was a group of "dedicated and supportive individuals." They didn't just answer her questions; they also took the time to brainstorm numerous plans to help Iraj achieve her goals. Their expertise allowed them to anticipate potential roadblocks and come up with ways to overcome them. Today, Iraj is an investigative auditor

at the New York State Inspector General's Office.



Alexandra Rivera, a current CUNY BA student, aspires to be a social media manager, creating a concentration in Graphic Design and Digital Marketing. After transferring with an associate's degree in media technology from LaGuardia Community College to Queens College, she joined CUNY BA because it allowed her to merge her creative interests with her interests in technology, graphic design, and video editing. She described the program as "flexible, since it allows me to tailor my major with full control" by allowing her to choose classes with her Faculty Mentor that would fulfill her vision for herself. Alexandra has applied to study abroad and hopes to do so someday.

As someone who has changed their major three times, Alexandra recommends CUNY BA to students who find that searching for a major has been challenging, feel that the major they want does not exist or feel that currently available majors don't resonate with them.

CUNY BA helped professional artist and muralist **Denise Penizzotto** take her art career to the next level. Through the program, she created her own concentration combining arts, religion and art history into an **Artistic Dimensions of Religion** degree, which allowed her to explore how religious art tells stories about history and how it connects to other forms of art. Denise created a professional portfolio of writing pieces and artwork to apply for credit for life experience.

Denise also applied for and received scholarships through CUNY BA, including the Mellon Foundation Grant. The support she received through CUNY BA helped her win a full scholarship at Harvard Divinity School for her master's degree. Today, Denise is an adjunct professor in the Religion Department at Hunter College.





**Ethan Frisch** is the co-founder and co-CEO of Burlap & Barrel, a spice company that partners directly with smallholder farmers worldwide to source spices for professional chefs and home cooks. Before



launching his business, Ethan was a CUNY BA student designing his dual concentration in **Conflict Studies and Education** as well as **Social Change**.

His coursework inspired him to become a humanitarian aid worker, leading him to spend two and a half years in Afghanistan, where he helped build schools, roads and bridges. He reports that the knowledge and perspective he gained through his CUNY BA degree prepared him for the reality of understanding the political and social dynamics while he was living there. In Afghanistan, Ethan came across wild cumin for the first time, which sparked the idea for Burlap & Barrel. He launched the company in 2016 and his success has led him to profiles in the *New* 

York Times, a "Shark Tank" appearance, and collaborations with Martha Stewart and the Jane Goodall Institute. Looking back, Ethan says he wouldn't be where he is today without CUNY BA. When considering his academic and professional career, his message to students is, "Don't accept the structures that someone else presents you with. There are other ways of doing things that are better, faster and more fun."

# National & Prestigious Fellowship Award Winners

Working with CUNY BA Advisement, James Kogan, a 2019 CUNY BA graduate, has been awarded a Fulbright US Student Program Study Research Award to conduct research on the *kaba gaida*, a traditional folk bagpipe, in Bulgaria. While in CUNY BA, James was based at Hunter College, where he completed an area of concentration Social and Cultural Theory in under the mentorship of Professor Jeff Allred (English, Hunter College).



CUNY BA student Laiba Mahmood has been named a recipient of the Barry M. Goldwater Scholarship for 2025. The prestigious scholarship, awarded to students pursuing careers in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics, supports outstanding undergraduates with strong potential to become leaders in research. She is studying environmental biology and geology, with a keen interest in planetary science and astrobiology, particularly the study of planetary habitability and the evolution of life. She has participated in microbial biogeochemistry research at the University of Michigan and modeled landscape and species evolution in the LEGACi Lab. This summer (2025), she will conduct research in planetary science at MIT/NASA. She hopes to pursue a PhD in planetary science.

# **Doctoral Fellows**



#### Graduate Center Doctoral Fellows

The CUNY BA Doctoral Fellows Program provides seven doctoral students with the paid opportunity to gain substantive administrative experience, develop professional competencies, and build a distinguished portfolio of accomplishments, while playing a key role in supporting the program. The cohort of Fellows provides vital support to the program in recruitment, grant-writing, assessment, community-building, communication, event planning, student leadership development, peer mentoring, and academic- and professional-skill building workshops and events. Each year, a Senior Fellow is selected to lead the cohort of doctoral students to assist the program in five major areas:

- Academic enrichment helping offer regular academic and professional workshops, such as applying
  to graduate school and national and prestigious fellowships. Workshops focus on increasing access
  to Kuh's (2008) high-impact opportunities, for example, an undergraduate research skills series and
  the end of year Student Showcase. Fellows have created and update student resources such as the
  undergraduate research guide.
- **Recruitment** coaching prospective student applicants; conducting outreach to prospective students on opportunities in the program; represent the program at admissions events; creating recruitment materials; responding to student inquiries, leading events and information sessions.
- Communication strategies to engage the CUNY BA community, including current and prospective students, faculty mentors, alumnx, and allies. Projects include writing press releases and student stories for social media, newsletter, and the program webpage. Student stories focus on their creation of majors, lessons learned, outcomes, and advice to other students.
- Student leadership development overseeing three paraprofessional opportunities for CUNY BA students: the Student Leadership Council (SLC); Peer Mentor program and student Ambassadors' programs, including recruitment; SLC elections, student leadership development and training, guidance and problem-solving.
- Special projects such as grant-writing, assessment, analyzing survey data, and other special
  opportunities. In 2024-2025, one Fellow received supplemental funding to participate in the CUNY

BA qualitative research study on the major-building process. For 2025-2026, one Fellow will work on an eportfolio for CUNY BA students and two Fellows will coordinate microgrants for self-designed service projects, including recruiting students, running the selection committee process, notifying students, and accountability review and reporting.

- **Flora Brandl,** Art History with research interests in global contemporary art, histories of performance art, postcolonial theory, and Cold War studies.

- Maria Litvan, Theatre and Performance. Her dissertation explores the interrelation between absence and presence in performative transmissions in the Americas

# Highlights: GC Doctoral Fellows Initiatives

In additions to successful grant writing, assessment, program development, and innovations in the CUNY newsletter, three special Doctoral Fellows Initiatives were exceptional: creating an "applicant coach"; developing a new alumni-student networking event, and the large increase in participation in the CUNY BA Student Showcase.

# New Initiative: Prospective Student Coaching

One Doctoral Fellow launched and was dedicated to recruitment of new students, including regular one-on-one coaching sessions to help students create a preliminary course plan for a unique, interdisciplinary major, required to apply. Creating coaching materials, she coached forty-two students this year, creating a strategy for these meetings.




The Doctoral Fellows positions are very competitive. Fellows set learning goals and learn about:

# **Showcase Participants**

**Jack Cameron** studies **Neuroscience and Social Epidemiology** through CUNY BA and the CUNY Graduate School of Public Health & Health Policy's 4+1 MPH Program in Epidemiology and Biostatistics. His



research interests focus on developing novel methods to assess and predict cognitive decline along the dementia continuum, with particular attention to how multimorbidity and structural inequities shape cognitive aging. Jack is currently involved in research at both the Albert Einstein College of Medicine and Brooklyn College, CUNY. His work includes efforts to validate the Remote Cognitive Aging and Alzheimer's Disease REsearch (R-CARE) Toolbox in a diverse Bronx sample and to investigate how common medical comorbidities influence the endorsement of subjective cognitive concerns among older adults. He has also contributed to projects at University College London examining the clinical and research utility of a portable, ultra-low-field MRI scanner for dementia-related neurodegeneration. Before moving to New York, Jack worked as an emergency medical technician in coastal New England.

Jack now serves as both the Recitation Coordinator and a Recitation Leader for General Chemistry I at The City College. As a JK Watson Fellow, he will join Partners in Health this summer in Malawi to conduct mixed-methods research on the role of community health workers in reducing the morbidity of non-communicable diseases and to support the development of social health interventions in remote communities.

- The Memorial Scholarship (for Students in Social Work, Human Services, Health or Education) from Mary Beth and Richard Ketchum in memory of their parents, for CUNY BA students studying, working in, or preparing for careers in health, human services, social welfare or education.

The Barbara Price endowment is currently at

for scholarships and experiential grants.

- Barbara Price Opportunity Fund (for All CUNY BA Students) offers
   opportunity grants that increase access to three types of high-impact experiential learning
   opportunities: study abroad, undergraduate research, and unpaid internships.
- **Barbara Price Scholarship** (for First-Semester Students) supports first-semester CUNY BA students. It is a one-time award of \$2,500 designed to assist new students in the program.
- The Thomas W. Smith Academic Fellowship (renewable award for academic excellence) are funded through a donation by Mr. Thomas W. Smith to recognize academic excellence. Awards are renewable and full-time students receive up to \$4,000 per semester, more than the cost of attendance.
- The Anne Duncan Somsen Memorial Fund (for First-Generation Students) CUNY Baccalaureate alumna Pennell Somsen established this fund, in memory of her mother, to support CUNY BA students who are the first in their families to pursue a college education.
- The Barbara Sproul Scholarship (for students in Religious Studies) Established in honor of Religious Studies Professor and CUNY BA Faculty Mentor Barbara Sproul, supporting CUNY BA students who are pursuing religious studies or a related interdisciplinary field.

For 2024-2025, CUNY BA gave seven types of scholarships, totaling 167 awards and \$420,000 direct to students for 2024-2025.

#### Academic Advisement

- Advisors provided general academic advisement, meeting with students, conducting credit checks and graduation audits, and support as needed throughout the year. During the admissions process, advisors meet with each incoming student, helping them complete applications and register (e.g., navigating ePermits and registering for courses University-wide.)
- Three times a year, (October, April & July), the advisors, Academic Director, and Registrar conduct a holistic review of active students and twice a year (January & June), review sessions to track academic standing and student success, offering additional support and intervention if needed.
- The advisors facilitated workshops and events, including Finding a Faculty Mentor, New Student
  Orientations, and others. The advisors revised materials, including the Student Handbook, CUNY BA 101 Orientation online module, and other materials for the admissions onboarding process. New materials include a refreshed program website, and new materials supporting the Narrative roadmap assignment.
- Kate McPherson serves on the cross-CUNY Advisement Council and this year served on an ad hoc University committee ePermit policy.

# Promoting Study Abroad

- Advisors continued to partner with Scholarships and the CUNY BA team to promote study abroad and to help confirm eligibility for Barbara Price Study Abroad opportunities grants.
- This academic year, CUNY BA students studied abroad in Costa Rica, France, Italy, Japan, Mexico, Spain, the Netherlands, and UK. They received at least four Gilman Scholarships.

#### Qualitative Research Study

With the \$5,000 funding of a PSC research grant, the CUNY BA is interviewing 23 students twice over the year to understand how students build a unique interdisciplinary curriculum, the challenges and opportunities to better serve students.

#### Allstate Grant Award for Service Projects

This year, the CUNY BA successfully applied for a \$15,000 Allstate grant to give micrograms to CUNY BA students creating their own service projects. The microgrant application process will run for 2025-2026.

#### AI and Individualized, Interdisciplinary Learning

While recommendations and rules on use of GenAl are evolving quickly, based on a mandate from CUNY Central emphasizing the importance of developing Al literacy in students to remain competitive in the workplace, the CUNY BA hosted a conversation on using Al while preserving writing as an important tool for reflective metacognition when designing a unique major.



Discussion focused on a potential policy and strategies to use (and not use) Al. Students are allowed to use Al in background research for a unique concentration, such as for research into disciplines and existing majors; exploring intersections of disciplines; and identifying timely topics at the intersection of disciplines. While difficult to monitor, students have been asked not to use Al in writing their personal narratives or scholarship applications.

Dr. Clark Vaisman, Academic Director, co-presented at a national conference on use of AI in developing a unique concentration while preserving critical thinking skills essential to learning outcomes in an individualized major at the 2025 IMP Network for Interdisciplinary and Individualized Major Programs Network, in Orlando Florida.
